
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COMPASSIONATE CAFÉ ONE YEAR ON!

WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP with Rennie Grove Peace Hospice Care with support from St Albans City & District Council, St Saviour's Compassionate Café has been meeting a pastoral need for over a year now. Open on the second Tuesday of every month in the Parish Hall, the café offers a welcome to anyone who has been affected by bereavement or any type of loss, and creates space for a friendly chat and a chance to meet others. Planning for the Café was led by Libby Agrotis and Fr Corniel, and builds on initial conversations that began in 2018. Members of the PCC engaged with the Reaching New People project in the Diocese and began to think about the vision of offering some kind of community café space as part of our outreach and mission. Before leaving for the distant wilds of Watford Fr Corniel said: "We are really excited with how this project is developing. Loss affects many people in different ways, and is something that goes beyond bereavement. The Café is very much a community project which as a church we are pleased to host, and through partnering with Rennie Grove we have a number of volunteers from the local area who have joined the team!"

The Café is just one aspect of our response to our second MAP Priority to 'identify new projects and partnerships to increase community engagement'. The Café is open every second Tuesday, 2-3.30pm in the Hall.






Welcome to Emily!

YEAR-LONG CONSULTATIONS ON NEW CHURCH HEATING SYSTEM

HAVING BEEN LESS than satisfactory for a number of years the gas heating finally gave up the ghost during the Vicar's sabbatical in 2023. When engineers inspected the system early in 2024 it was condemned as unsafe and the churchwardens instructed that the heaters should be disconnected andthe gas supply capped. Then began a process of consultation, first with the Diocesan Net Zero Carbon Officer to ensure that any possible solution would comply with the PCC's commitment to reducing carbon emissions and so lay the foundations for a sustainable future for St Saviour's. Following a site survey the Diocesan Net Zero Officer submitted a comprehensive report to the PCC outlining a series of options based on his assessment of the needs of the worshipping congregation, local community and the practical requirements of the building.

There then followed a series of surveys, specifications and quotations from a variety of professionals ranging from a traditional 'wet' underfloor heating system (similar to the one recently installed at St Peter's and with an anticipated costs of over a guarter of a million pounds), to infrared electric heaters at the head of each column in the nave, very similar to the system removed in the late 1970's to make way for the gas heaters. Unit costs for this scheme would have been considerably lower, but installation and rewiring supervised by our architect would have more than doubled the price and not been the quick and easy solution we had initially hoped for. The most aesthetically satisfying suggestion was a series of 10 wrought iron chandeliers bearing electric heaters at a cost of £7k per chandelier, plus rewiring, installation and VAT. But in every case the contractor advised the same, that for a building of St Saviour's size, no single solution would be possible. Fundamentally the space in church is unheatable. So the focus would need to be on heating the people, and whichever scheme was decided on, it would only ever be one part of the solution.





In granting the faculty for the proposed scheme, the Diocesan Chancellor praised the PCC for its level of thought, creativity and commitment to net zero thinking. Once a tender price has been accepted the PCC will be able to apply for grant assistance from the Diocese, and the remaining costs can be met from PCC funds.

CONGREGATION FIRST

Looking for a way forward that was both affordable and offering a relatively quick return for the worshipping congregation, the church architect and Diocesan NZC Officer proposed a scheme which has recently being trialed in smaller churches. Rather than expensive underfloor excavations, an electric heat mat would be installed in the section of the nave where the congregation are seated which heats up to 28°C in 15-20 min. As with a conventional underfloor system, the heat rises and warms people before it dissipates above average head height. The PCC has now instructed the architect to go ahead with a fourzone scheme at an estimated cost of £23k-£25k. Tenders were expected to be in before Christmas but our preferred contractor, Lodge & Son have only just been able to assess the job in order to bid. The PCC expects to receive tenders and authorize the works at its extraordinary meeting on Weds 26 Feb.

NAVE DEVELOPMENT: INITIAL VISUALIZATION

AS THERE IS no single solution to heating the church building efficiently or economically as it is, we need to think how such a vast space might be adapted to provide areas which can be heated separately for various meetings and activities. The basic vision was outlined at the APCM in May 2024 with a positive response from those present, but the original idea goes back to a meeting between the PCC and the Diocesan Advisory Committee before lockdown. Their assessment was that access urgently needs to be improved, and that it is unacceptable for the church to have no toilet facilities in the main building. The PCC had already highlighted the need for a kitchen/coffee area to be

made permanent, and in addition to the provision of WCs had included a church office and meeting space in their 'wish list'. The wood panel and glass partitioning shown in the visualization above includes on the left a kitchen/bar area and toilets in the current St Michael's Chapel, with a staircase leading to a mezzanine floor with a meeting room, storage and access to the bell and roof space. On the right side nearest the font is an office area and a second meeting room but with no upper floor so leaving the stained glass window unaffected. The PCC have asked the architect to prepare a scheme for presentation to the DAC and there will be a consultation meeting with the congregation in the coming months as things progress. We assess costs and explore applications to grant making trusts.

ORGAN TRANSPLANT

You may be aware there are two pipe organs in church, but your may not realise why! The Victorian organ in the chancel is used for the Parish Mass each week, but in need of substantial repair and renovation. In the last few years we have made minor repairs and begun to build up a fund to enable its full restoration. The larger instrument is the property of the International Organ Festival and has resided at St Saviour's rent free since 1989. The IOF are in the process of arranging its transfer to St Paul's, Knightsbridge but have to strengthen the gallery where it will be sited! Once gone, we will be in a position to resume a conversation with the DAC and The Victorian Society about the removal of our choirstalls and plans to enlarge the nave altar platform to improve its use for concerts, and include heating mats like those planned for the nave.



INTERFAITH FRIENDSHIP HITS THE AIRWAVES

Each year there's a nominated local charity that benefits from the bucket cash collection each night. This year's charity was **Herts Young Homeless** and



the ten evenings generated a record **£1,460** to support young people living on our streets.
